

Into The Dustbin: Rajendra Pachauri, The Climate Report & The Nobel Peace Prize



Synopsis

Rajendra Pachauri, the chairman of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), is a non-stop train wreck. The IPCC is supposed to be an objective scientific body, but Pachauri writes forewords for Greenpeace publications and has accepted a "green crusader" award. He is an aggressive policy advocate even though his organization is supposed to be policy neutral. In 1996, an Indian High Court concluded that he "suppressed material facts" and "sworn to false affidavits." Contrary to longstanding claims, he earned only one PhD rather than two. This book is a collection of essays about Pachauri originally published as blog posts between February 2010 and August 2013. Essay number one, "The IPCC and the Peace Prize," appears here for the first time. It documents how Pachauri improperly advised IPCC personnel that they were Nobel laureates after that organization was awarded half of the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize (Al Gore received the other half). Scientists aren't supposed to embellish. They're supposed to be clear-eyed about what is true and what is false. The idea that hundreds of scientists have been padding their resumes, that they've been walking around in broad daylight improperly claiming to be Nobel laureates, isn't something any normal person would expect. But that is exactly what happened. It took the IPCC five years to correct the record. During that time, media outlets, science academies, and government officials went along for the ride. The moral of this story is that, when faced with a choice between the unadorned truth and exaggeration, IPCC personnel made the wrong call. Their judgment can't be trusted.

A sad tale about the bias of the IPCC and how the greens have jammed things down the throat of the public. Very informative book regarding IPCC biases. This book is a collection of essays published between February 2010 and August 2013 centered around Rajendra Pachauri, the head of the IPCC climate report. After the IPC shared the Nobel Prize, he told everyone who helped write the report that they were a Nobel Prize winner, which of course they were not. When the IPCC got the Nobel, it meant just what it said, the IPCC got the Nobel prize, and not the individual authors and editors. Thus there were many people who for about 5 years were going around claiming that they had won a Nobel Prize. It took the five years to get the IPCC to correct the error. Mr. Rajendra Pachauri as the head of the IPCC would be expected to be non partisan and as neutral as he could be regarding what is called global warming. However, he has taken sides and signed up as a supporter of green causes. All in all, this collection of essays and posts expose Mr. Rajendra Pachauri as very much of a partisan in the debates about global warming. This certainly calls into question his objectivity, and thus the objectivity of the IPCC report is for no other reason, that he is an avowed environmentalist who has publicly chosen sides on this issue.

I am so impressed with Donna's writing. She is the perfect journalist. Passionate and committed, of course. You would have to be to do the massive amount of research she does. But she does not rely on empty rhetoric. She writes in a highly contested area, and her work will inevitably be closely scrutinised and savagely attacked by equally passionate vested interests. However, like all top journalists, she will prove to be untouchable because she never makes an assertion without it being supported by the facts. I don't read her work for literary style and rhetorical flourishes but for the facts. This book is not pleasant to read, but it is essential if you are to understand the origins of the irrational and vicious wrangling that pollutes the climate debate.

Donna Laframboise provides a collection of fascinating revelations about Rajendra Pachauri, the chairman of the UN's so called "peak scientific body" - the IPCC. The reader can only wonder how and why this man ever got the top job as IPCC chairman. He is not a scientist let alone a climate scientist. Perhaps what Donna outlines in this book about Pachauri explains why the IPCC is nothing but an incompetent activist body determined to peddle dangerous man-made global warming propaganda in pursuit of an international agreement on fossil fuel energy use. If you look at any organisation, you only have to look at who is at the head of the organisation to tell you need what you need to know about that body. By telling us about Pachauri, Donna gives the reader a good idea about what sort of an organisation the IPCC is ... and it's not a pretty picture. An enjoyable book.

This really tells the story of the exaggerations, 1/2 truths & outright lies spread by the IPCC & its chairman, Rajendra Pachauri. Donna Laframboise has done it again with another exposé of this organisation & its leaders. Having read her previous book I had high expectations for this one. Lumped together, the repetition in the posts labours a few principal points rather than adding any new insights into the workings of the IPCC or its chairman. If you read Donna Laframboise's blog there is little point in purchasing this book..
