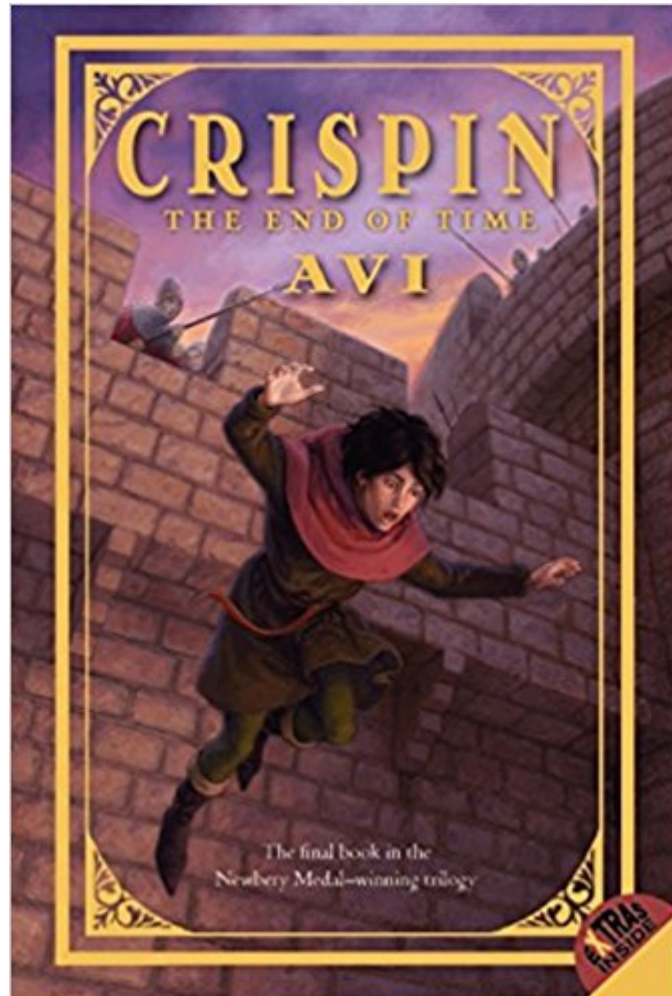




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Crispin: The End Of Time

Still grieving for the fatherly protector they called Bear, Crispin and his friend Troth wander northward through the fourteenth-century French countryside in rags, begging for food and hoping to arrive in Iceland. They arrive at a convent where the nuns value Troth's skill with healing herbs, and she decides to stay. Alone and near starvation, Crispin joins a troupe of traveling musicians

who prove to be a band of murderous thieves. Discovering their plot against him strengthens Crispin's determination to escape, to free their servant boy, and to make his way to Iceland. Crispin's physical and emotional suffering, magnified by the story's almost unremitting tension, make this one of the less-romanticized medieval novels written for young people. Though the publisher states that the trilogy beginning with the Newbery-winning *Crispin: The Cross of Lead* (2002) ends here, the conclusion, which holds the promise of more adventures for Crispin, may not satisfy fans. Still, with necessary elements from the previous books related quickly, even readers new to the series will find this a compelling, first-person narrative. Grades 5-8. --Carolyn Phelan

An amazing writer, my two children, aged 9 and 11, and I, read all three books of this trilogy right through. Gripping, beautifully written, historically rich. Avi puts us into another time and shows us

the lives of those who are not often seen in our histories: the poor, the people just getting by, the outlawed, the sick and the survivors. My one and only wish were that the last 2 books of the series had some of the bright moments that the first had. In the first, Bear is so alive; he is a force for life. And in the last two, we have little escape from the darkness.

The book ended , Crispin follows Bear's dream with a new set of what you could call friend and safe acquaintances. After that we won't know.

The best part of AVI's Crispin trilogy is that he takes kids and teens as real people with real concerns. In this book Crispin is still dealing with problems most American kids don't have...but some do and others in luckier circumstances need to know that. A thought-provoking story.

Overall, the book was really good and the ending left a sense of closure and possibility. But if you've only read the first one, then I would recommend to stay with that, it's not that the last two books are bad, they're as good as they could be but they take away everything he had secured at the end of the first book . But, if you have already read the second(most likely for the majority of y'all reading this)then the damage has been done and I'm pretty sure you don't want to leave the series on that depressing note.
