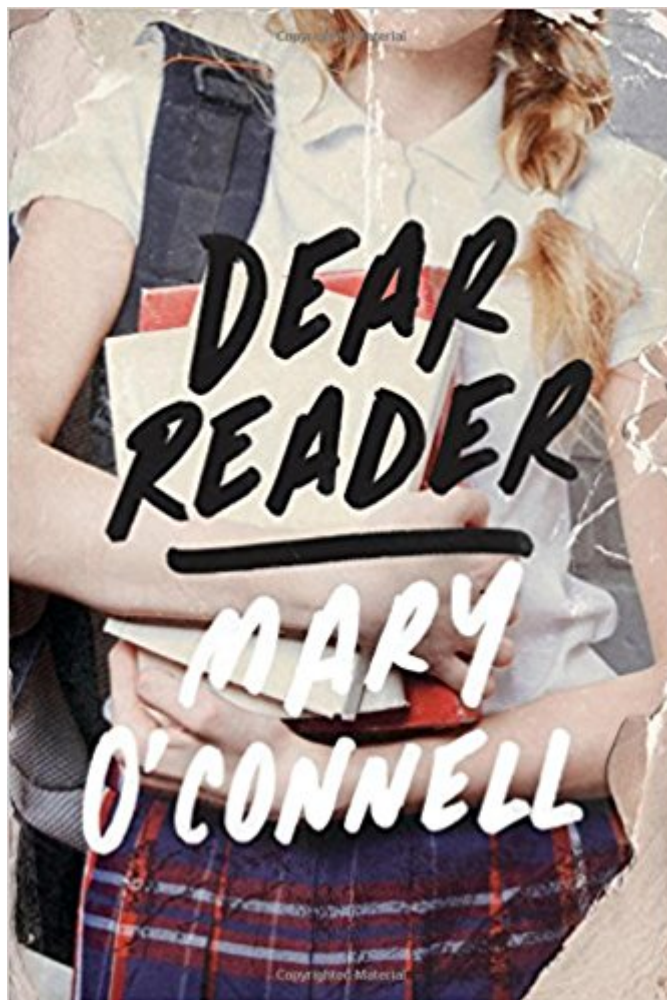


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Dear Reader: A Novel

For seventeen-year-old Flannery Fields, the only respite from the plaid-skirted mean girls at Sacred Heart High School is her beloved teacher Miss Sweeney’s AP English class. But when Miss Sweeney doesn’t show up to teach Flannery’s favorite book, Wuthering Heights, leaving behind her purse, Flannery knows something is wrong. The police are called, and Flannery gives them everything except Miss Sweeney’s copy of Wuthering Heights. This she holds onto. And good thing she does, because when she opens it, it has somehow transformed into Miss Sweeney’s real-time diary. It seems Miss Sweeney is in New York City and she’s in trouble. So Flannery does something very unFlannery-like: she skips school and sets out for Manhattan, with the book as her guide. But as soon as she arrives, she meets a boy named Heath. Heath is British, on a gap year, incredibly smart yet he’s never heard of Albert Einstein or Anne Frank. In fact, Flannery can’t help thinking that he seems to have stepped from the pages of Brontë’s novel. Could it be that Flannery is spending this topsy-turvy day with her ultimate fictional romantic hero, Heathcliff, reborn in the twenty-first century?

I treasured my time with this book. I kept a pencil to underline the phrases I didn't want to forget.

Biased being from under the big sky as referenced the world was an oasis to escape into and relive days of youth and young love while rooting for both voices/characters. For all the teachers with histories, (their students could never imagine!) this book poses the dichotomy of this arrangement with grace, humor and poignance. As O'Connell suggests we do want to change our narrative and can. O'Connell once more takes on religious hypocrisy and gives hope to the "unpopular". It's just a matter of time. If only time could imprint the lessons of kindness and high school could truly change. If not this is a literary poultice. Books certainly transport us but can also give us "lessons about meaning, sense, and clarity".

This book is lyrically and lovely. Flannery and Miss Sweeney intertwined stories are exhilarating and sobering. Life never quite takes you where you were expecting and neither does this book. Not your typical YA fare, not to be missed.

I loved this book. Mary O'Connell, with her beautiful prose, took me on such a wonderful literary journey in DEAR READER. It's an English major's dream combination of stories, combining the three narratives, if you include Wuthering Heights. I don't like to give spoilers in reviews but I prefer to read books without knowing too much going in. This is what I can tell you: I was captured from the first page. I loved the characters voices and how O'Connell blended them with Emily Brontë's voices and then how I was reminded of my own college triumphs, regrets, and mistakes. There's a little bit of magic in Dear Reader too, but it blends seamlessly. I recommended keeping a pencil in hand to underline the lovely sentences. But also, you may find yourself, as I did, writing lengthy thoughts on DEAR READER, but also your own stories and memories in the margins of this dreamy book.

This book is perfect for teens and adults. I think it would pair greatly with the classic that it is based on. Like other reviews have said it's almost reminiscent of Gilmore Girls...with a hint of Mean Girls. It covers important topics that do need discussed so I think it'd be great for a mother daughter read.

Nobody writes with more wit, intelligence and humanity than Mary O'Connell. Dear Reader follows the journeys of two uncommonly smart, perceptive women and their love of books. It's a beautiful story how books are a refuge in a world that

doesn't always appreciate sensitive and thoughtful young women. Mary has an amazing ability to lift even the most mundane details of life, like a young mother in a Laundromat with her child, and turn it into something sublime. Get it!
