


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# Best Of The Best From Minnesota: Selected Recipes From Minnesota's Favorite Cookbooks

I have not found a recipe that I must try yet though if this is your first midwest cookbook it would be a good choice.

I grew up in Iowa. I have a handful of Iowa cookbooks. After purchasing this cookbook, I have looked through it several times and I can't find ONE recipe that I want to try. The book is filled with 60s-era semi-homemade recipes using ingredients like mushroom soup as a base. Its clear the authors just randomly selected recipes from community cookbooks with no consideration as to whether or not they were eatable and no kitchen trials. Don't waste your money. The classic is still, "Cooks Tour of Iowa." It contains real from-scratch recipes from various regions and immigrant groups in the state. If you don't want to spend money, "The Pioneer Woman Cooks" blog has a lot of up-to-date recipes that remind me of Iowa cooking and its free. Her simple recipes are far superior to anything you find in this waste of paper.
